Short description of the university	<p>On February 19, 1890, the Executive Branch, by decree of the Dr. Carlos Pellegrini in his capacity as Vice Chairman of the Executive and countersigned by the Minister of Justice, Cult and Public Instruction, Dr. Filemon Posse, created the "Business School of the Capital of the Republic," which began operating in Alsina Street building No. 1552.</p> <p>It was at the initiative of the deputy Juan Balestra that the School was renamed, from 1908, "Carlos Pellegrini", in memory of a prominent public figure. On the basis of this School and by decree dated February 26, 1910, signed by Dr. Joaquin Figueroa Alcorta, endorsed by the Minister of Education Dr. Romulo S. Naón, the Institute of Higher Business Studies was created, which after some vicissitudes of suppression and restoration, became on October 9, 1913 in the current School of Economic Sciences of the University of Buenos Aires.</p> <p>Today, 100 years later, our faculty is proud to be the largest in Latin America, by choice of our students. There are about 55,000 students circulating in our classrooms scattered in different locations.</p> <p>Our educational offer consists of five undergraduate: CPA, BA in Business Administration, Bachelor of Economics, Bachelor of Information Systems and Actuarial Sciences.</p> <p>Academic freedom as a guarantee of pluralism and respect for diversity of views, equal access and co-government, are part of the principles that form the UBA identity and give strength to our daily action. It is this identity that supports us towards society, the society that sustains us and to which our faculty knowledge transfer.</p>

<p>To pass a course, students must pass the 2 or 3 exams required by each chair and must have an attendance of 75% or more. The scores for undergraduate studies reflect a scale of 0-10.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If a student earns a grade between 7 and 10, the student will pass the subject directly, without sitting for a final exam. • If a student earns a grade between 4 and 6, the student shall sit for a final exam to pass the subject. • If a student earns a grade between 0 and 3, it means that the student failed the subject.

Tuition fees and cost of living											
Are there any mandatory fees exchange students need to pay?	<p>Yes, U\$S200, to be paid by credit card or local currency in cash.</p> <p>The administrative fee comprises several items: Enrollment to the courses; the procedure to change the courses selected by the students, either because of difficulties with the course topics as well as with the language; the Buddy Program; the registration of the student with the Migration office; assistance with procedures required to obtain the Student Visa; the issuing of Certificates of Enrollment; the issuing of the Student Card, with which they can obtain several discounts, including discounts for transportation fares not only for day-to-day travel but also for tourism purposes, museum admissions discounts, among others; the signing of documentation asked for by the students, either for scholarships or required by their home University; the procurance and issuing of Transcripts, and the sending of those Transcripts to the student's home University, via post and e-mail.</p>
